## From our President . . .

Transportation Bill is due at the
end of the month. Hopefully all our
efforts will go for a strong Bill. Likely,

will not have been passed. So, if
possible, all of us need to double
our efforts to make sure Washington
is aware of the importance of this



Bill. Support has come from the Laborers International Union of North America and other groups. They have put forth a pamphlet "How to Survive a Bridge Collapse," and the radio commercial "American Bridges are falling down" commercial. Not exactly subtle, but what is subtle these days?

I am seeing signs of optimism with the economy and especially, the transportation sector. I read an article in the Enquirer which boasted a creation of over 1000 new civil engineer jobs in Ohio alone by 2018. I have to take some of that with a grain of salt as they did not state their sources. The average salary appears to have dropped but that may be due to the high amount of recent graduates needed to take these jobs.

#### ASHE PIN (Political Information Network) REPORT - December 2011

It has been quit a roller coaster ride since the last writing of the ASHE PIN in January 2012! In the beginning of February, House Transportation Chairman Mica did get his transportation bill though his committee. There were 144 amendments offered to the Chairman, but only 27 were added in a marathon session that went through the night. Speaker John Boehner was now left with getting it approved by the House. However, the bill with no earmarks, very few amendments, and eliminated transit funding, also was missing one crucial item-the votes needed to pass it out of the House.

Speaker Boehner recognized the lack of the necessary votes and refused to bring it to the floor on the scheduled date of February 17, 2012. He pulled the bill amid objection to its spending levels from both conservatives and liberals, who argued that it spent too much and too little on highway programs respectively. He hoped to gain votes over the president week recess, but that did not materialize. As the Speaker was trying to get votes for the bill, he made some concessions to the original format of the bill. In addition to shortening the length of the highway reauthorization from five years to two years, the Speaker also scrapped the proposal to remove transit funding from the highway trust fund that was criticized by Democrats and several Northeast Republicans. Speaker Boehner has kept in the provision of using monies from new energy sources to fund the House version of the bill. As of today, however, Speaker Boehner still does not have the votes to pass a bill in the House.

While the drama of the House was ensuing, the Senate has successfully introduced their bipartisan 2-year transportation bill co-authored by California Democrat Barbara Boxer and Oklahoma Republican James Inhofe. A vote is expected today, March 14, 2012, on their measure. The overall bill would spend \$109 billion over less than two years, which would spend all the money that is in the Highway Trust fund with no solution for future funding. The bill would increase the flow of highway aid to states by adjusting current spending levels to take into account inflation over the past several years. States would have greater discretion over how to spend the money, but the bill also would create a new regime of performance and project eligibility requirements aimed at preventing waste and making sure national goals are met. The measure also would reduce the number of federal transportation programs by roughly two-thirds in an effort to eliminate duplication. Bicycle, pedestrian, safe routes to schools and railsto-trails programs — which were targeted by Republicans — were preserved by moving them into a larger congestion mitigation program where they would have to compete with other programs for money.

While this movement on a new transportation bill is a good sign, the March 31, 2012 expiration of SAFE-TEA LU and the ability to collect the highway user's fee looms closer. We need a new transportation law! What can ASHE do about the situation? Call your Congressional Representatives in both Houses and urge them to pass the bill. The Secretary Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood has vividly described the nation's roads as "one big pothole." Let us do what we can to make it clear to Congress that we need these potholes filled!



#### **GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES**

#### Tuesday, January 24, 2012 Montgomery Inn Boathouse

President Schoelwer called the meeting to order with the pledge of allegiance at 11:45 am and recognized two guests, Jillian Lancer of HDR and Aaron Muck from Terracon.

President Schoelwer presented a lifetime achievement award to Bill Brayshaw. Jack Pflum spoke about the retirement of Bill Brayshaw and the importance of providing accurate information to the press. He read a letter from Ted Hubbard that was sent to the Cincinnati Enquirer correcting information that they published regarding the retirement and potential rehire of County Engineering staff.

Secretary Emerick indicated that meeting minutes are on table for the December Holiday meeting and encouraged members to update contact information in the new Wild Apricot membership management program.

Chris Nyberg gave the Treasurer's report, announcing a starting balance of \$23,631.22, deposits of \$965.00 and expenses of \$1,551.50 resulting in operating capital of \$23,044.72. There are currently 144 members in our section. Chris encouraged members to sign up for meetings through the Wild Apricot reservation feature.

President Schoelwer congratulated Caroline Duffy for her reappointment to the National Board of Directors.

Caroline Duffy presented the PIN report, noting that the Senate went back into session yesterday with a deadline of having the transportation bill passed by March 31, 2012. The Senate has approved a two-year reauthorization of federal highway programs at current funding levels. Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act is the new transportation bill proposed which features reauthorization of the Federal-aid highway program at the Congressional Budget Office's baseline level, consolidation of Federal programs, elimination of earmarks, expedited project delivery while protecting the environment, "America Fast Forward", which strengthens the Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Program (TIFIA) and provides for a consolidated freight program. The House Transportation Committee is working on a five-year version of the bill. Additional sources of funding are being explored including leveling fees on new energy production such as shale gas reserves. The House committee won a commitment from leaders for the full House to debate the transportation bill in February. ASHE members are encouraged to contact their legislators, write letters to editors and use other methods to get the word out to pass the National Transportation Bill.

Brad Ackel indicated that the Golf committee will be convening soon to plan this year's outing Membership is down to 144 due partly to attrition and records updating. President Schoelwer announced that we will look to subsidize those who have been laid off.

Stan Harris asked members to send newsletter articles in timely and announced that ASHE sections can apply for exposure funds of up to \$1,000.00. He asked attendees to let board

members know of any funding ideas.

Steve Proffitt announced that we will have the annual Capital Improvements program in March and the topic for the May program will be a laser scanning and mapping presentation.

After the presentations, ASHE members present were asked to vote for the top project in the over \$3 million and under \$3 million categories.

President Schoelwer announced that the ASHE 2012 conference will be held at Seven Springs, Pennsylvania. The next general membership meeting will be held on March 20th. PDH certificates can be picked up from the table in the hallway. Vanessa Fritsch reminded us of the SDITE 2012 meeting in April.

Joe Vogel raised a motion to adjourn the meeting which was seconded by Greg Wilkens. President Schoelwer adjourned the meeting at 1:00 pm.
